# Hope International Development Agency Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT**

#### **Objectives and aims**

The objectives of the charity are as follows:

- 1. To relieve poverty by:
  - a. assisting poor people in developing countries to help themselves;
  - b. motivating people in the UK to action in support of the developing world; and
  - c. facilitating and providing a mechanism for active participation between the people of the UK and the developing world.
- 2. To inform and educate people in the UK regarding issues relating to the developing world.

#### Significant activities

In 2018/19, Hope UK was able to send £69,100 to Hope Ethiopia's water and sanitation project in Chano Dorga, a poor rural community in the Arba Minch Zuria district of southern Ethiopia. This is one of HOPE's largest projects to date, with the spring 14.3km away from the two new water tanks. The community of 3,942 people provided much of the labour required to build the 15 water points, 10 wash basins and dig the lengthy pipeline that now is delivering the clean water from the newly capped springs to the community. No longer are their arduous 3-4 hour walks for water necessary and instead, children will have time to attend school and their parents have time to earn needed money for their families. In addition, 19 self-help groups have been formed and 380 women are now meeting regularly (in groups of 20 each) to save money, support one another and to receive training on starting their own small businesses. Case studies are being received about women who report a new sense of confidence - in themselves and their abilities to earn money and financially contribute to their households.

Hope UK additionally sent to Hope Cambodia £2,950, a donation specifically made for water projects in that country.

We had some real success with applications to grant making bodies in 2018/19, with grants totalling £30,760, three times the total raised from such sources last year. Once again, we were generously supported by the Waterloo Foundation, who gave a grant of £10,000 to the project in Chano Dorga, and by a major donor who wonderfully gave over £15,000. The regular support of our core of committed donors continues to be a real encouragement and amounted to over £1,000 per month. This predictable income stream, the large majority unrestricted, helps us to budget and plan and we really value the relationship we have with this set of long-standing supporters.

Church congregations and schools donated nearly £4,000 and successful events (parties and concerts) organised by our fund-raiser and Hope supporters raised nearly £5,000 and were a real opportunity to share up to date information about Hope's work with both existing and new supporters. Campaigns through the Global Giving platform raised £2,626 net from a wide net of supporters. Our costs (non-grant expenditure) at just over £9,000, were slightly lower than last year and, with the increased income, represents only 11% of total expenditure.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Reserves policy

The Trustees have reviewed the reserves of the charity. The trustees' policy is to maintain reserves at the minimum level needed to meet known expenditure commitments in the next month, in order to maximise the grants made to HOPE overseas (typically made twice a year). The trustees consider that the current level of reserves in the unrestricted and restricted funds is adequate for this purpose.

All other funds raised by the organisation are transferred to HOPE partners overseas (principally in Ethiopia), as funds allow, usually twice a year but with additional ad hoc transfers as required.

#### Principal funding sources

The sole source of funding during the period was donations from individuals and organisations.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

No new trustees were appointed in 2018/19.

#### Related parties

The objectives of the charity are consistent with those of its partner organisation, Hope International Development Agency (Canada), and there is a considerable degree of interdependence between the two charities. As the Head Office for Hope as a whole, the Canada office is responsible for oversight and governance of the Ethiopia portfolio which is wholly managed and run by Hope International Development Agency Ethiopia. Hope International Development Agency Ethiopia is registered with the Ethiopian government as an official non-government organisation.

#### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

#### 1. Accounting Policies

#### (a) General information and basis of preparation

Hope International Development Agency is a company limited by guarantee in the United Kingdom. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 1 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are set out on page 2.

The charitable company constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). The Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2016 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation to these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and methods of accounting) since last year.

#### (b) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### (c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

Donations and legacies are recognised in the financial statements when the charity is convinced that there is entitlement to the income, there is certainty of receipt and the amount in question is measurable.

Donated facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

#### 1. Accounting Policies - continued

#### (d) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred. Grant payments are recognised when a constructive obligation arises that result in the payment being unavoidable.

- Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income.
- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the projects supported by the charity and include both the direct costs and support costs relating to these activities.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are
  primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

#### (e) Stock

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

#### (f) Debtors

Other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due.

#### (g) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

#### (h) Creditors

Creditors are recognised when there is a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

Other creditors and accruals are recognised at their settlement amount

#### (i) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

#### (j) Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction.

#### (j) Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimated are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

All Hope's activities in Ethiopia are done in full consultation and partnership with the district authorities on the basis of a signed Memorandum of Understanding. The grant sent to Hope international Cambodia was for water projects in Pursat, for which the sum had been specifically donated by a single donor.
